"The most addictive website in the walking world"

Late in 2019 we put out our first press release in a long time, about our new Patron, the author Mike Parker. This prompted the Country Walking magazine to interview Mike and print a very favourable half-page article in their February 2020 edition. The article encouraged readers to use our website. "Have you discovered Geograph?" they wrote, "... you'll love it." Mike described the site as "what the internet was invented for: shared knowledge for curious people.... What you get is a really rounded, deep portrait of our land and how it changes."

This kind of publicity is invaluable, so more press releases are planned, probably two or three a year.

I've been dealing with privacy-related requests and enquiries which continue at a steady pace. My review of Geograph's cookie notice and privacy policy has

gone on the back burner while the Trustees work on our move to the cloud. My initial enquiries into how we use cookies were reassuring. We don't use any third-party analytics cookies so there is no rush on that front. I was really pleased with the response to the fund-raising appeal for our move to the cloud; it shows how committed people are to the project. The next few months will be exciting, but also slightly nerve-wracking as we pay for old and new hosting arrangements during the move.

The Cloud

We have been working with Tiger to construct a platform in the Cloud that would be capable of taking on the Geograph code. The first stage of this has now been completed and the second stage is about to begin. This important project, which will make Geograph much more resilient, has the highest priority. We anticipate that the second stage will be complete by June/July this year. After the second stage we have the massive task of actually migrating the code. Thanks go to all those who responded to our appeal for funds for this vital project.

In 2019, Geograph received £173 from Give as you Live, £88 from Amazon Smile and £44 from eBay via PayPal Giving Fund - all well worth having.

Accounts

The accounts for the year ended 31st December, 2019 were approved by the board of Directors at their meeting held on 8th February.

There was a surplus of income over expenditure of some \pounds 7,250. Donations totalled \pounds 25,560; Interest earned was \pounds 60; Expenses totalled \pounds 18,370 Much of the surplus is because some of the costs relating to the migration to the Cloud have not yet been expensed.

The accounts and Annual Report have been distributed to all company members.

Moderator consultation

Thirty volunteer Moderators work hard behind the scenes to check all contributions - making sure no inappropriate or substandard images get through, looking for obvious misplaced locations, typos and factual errors in descriptions, and classifying them into suitable 'image types'. The moderators also pick up change suggestions and if necessary discuss them with the original contributor before deciding whether to accept the change. In the last few months there has been a consultation with the moderators on how the suggestions system could be improved, and how communication among moderators is best achieved. The second stage of the consultation is still in progress and we hope to announce the outcome around the end of April.

I have been working with Christine and others to make the Geograph homepage accessible to Welsh language speakers. This has involved obtaining suitable translations of the terminology on the page. Users will now see that there is now the option to use "Cymraeg" to navigate the page. There is a basic Welsh Language image search function, which I aim to improve and fine tune a bit more over the coming months.

Migration to the Cloud is progressing. It is a massive task, but I hope I shall have a lot more news next time.
